Epiphany isn't a word most of us use in everyday conversation. In fact, you'll probably hear it most often in church.

At its core, the word means *revelation*—something being made known, whether it's a sudden insight or the revealing of God himself. Epiphany is often associated with light, reminding us that God's presence brings illumination to the world.

As we enter the season of Epiphany, we'll hear stories of Jesus revealing himself to the world. The season begins with the visit of the Magi and the Baptism of Jesus, and it concludes with the Transfiguration. In between we will hear Jesus' sermons, parables, and miracle stories.

Revealing Jesus to the world is one of our central tasks as a church and as his followers. At Christmas, we celebrate Jesus as the Light of the world, shining into our darkness. Now, we are called to live out his words: "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)

During my time here at Zion, one of my responsibilities is to help us reflect on how we can do this more faithfully as a congregation. In January, the Transition Team will share a survey with the congregation to help us understand where we are now. This insight will guide us as we grow and seek to be a brighter light in our community.

I encourage everyone connected with Zion—members and friends alike—to take part in the survey. Your participation will give us a clearer picture of who we are and how we can continue to shine Christ's light together.

Sunday Bible Class I



A new year – new plans – new goals. We have a wonderful interim pastor, but we will be searching for a new, permanent pastor/shepherd to lead Zion Lutheran. Do you have concerns or worries? I know that I do. I like to have things planned out, like a big lesson plan, and be ready

and prepared. God tells us He has a plan and we don't have to worry. He has everything arranged and He knows just what will be. He tells us not to worry. "Do not fear." And He calls us "little flock" because He knows we are like little lambs, frolicking about one minute and upside down in a ditch the next.

God's children, the people of Israel, had escaped the cruel

bondage of slavery in Egypt. When Pharaoh had second thoughts about freeing them, he send over 600 chariots to follow them (Exodus 14:6-8). As the children of Israel came to the Red Sea. they could only hear that army behind them. They knew if they were captured and made to return, it would have been much worse. They were AFRAID! So up stands Moses and declares: "Fear not! Stand still and see the salvation of the LORD. which He will accomplish for you today" (Exodus 14:13). I can imagine there were many trembling hearts and wide eyes. And you remember what happened: the children of Israel walked through the Red Sea on a dry path to the other side, safely. Pharaoh's armies quickly followed and the walls of water came crashing down, killing the armies. What a visual of God's protection that is. There were many times of deliverance and God's

provision as the children of Israel wandered in the wilderness. There are many times that God provides for His children as we wander about in this wilderness.

Sometimes we don't see God's provision right away, but He is there. We have faith in Him because He keeps His promises. And He tells us not to fear!

We have hope and help because God tells us that He will provide for our needs. He gives us His Holy Spirit: His Holy Helper. He helps us to pray and to learn. Our Holy Helper indwells us and helps us to reach out to others through His love, to proclaim His good news. God provided His first disciples, His first followers, with a Holy Helper, the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:81 NKJV). God will give us power to help reach out to share His love.

He promises to always be with us. To never leave us. "When you pass through the waters, I

will be with you; and through the rivers, they will not overflow you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be scorched. Nor will the flame burn you." (Isaiah 43:2 Legacy Standard Bible)

Do I know what will happen in the coming months? No. But I know that God has promised to be with us and send us His Holy Helper. He is always with us, even when we feel

alone or discouraged.






Movie Night

Board of Directors Notes

The Zion Lutheran Church Board of Directors' meeting November 23rd covered several organizational updates and governance decisions.

Church committee chairs summarized their goal and activities. The church music director, David Hunsberger, has planned a beautiful music program for the upcoming Christmas season including a string quartet for Christmas Eve. The Property Committee shared ongoing responsibilities and recent improvements, including security upgrades, wall repairs, and the electronic welcome sign and plans to repair of lighting of the exterior cross. Any expenditures beyond \$500 must be approved by the Board. Please see updates on the many ongoing mission- and community-based activities in the monthly newsletter including this month's Christian Concerns Pillowcase project and LWML Holiday Boutique to support seminarians in training.

The Alpha School lease has been signed and facility upgrades are now underway - including exterior painting approved by the board. Alpha schools plans to add fencing, signage, and additional safety measures soon to enable the official school opening in January. We are thankful for this new tenant, as the 2-year commitment to lease the space represents a significant source of income and sustainability for the church.

Finally, the Board is planning to complete a financial review in first half of 2026. The review is overdue and must be completed to ensure financial health of the church. In order to ensure more timely communication and governance, the Board voted to begin monthly meetings on the second Sunday of each month. The December meeting was on the 14th. The next meeting in January 11th.



PARISH NURSING

Emotional Labor/Kindness Matters

Emotional labor refers to the work of managing your emotions and expressions. Sometimes we don't show our genuine emotions in our interactions with others. It can be difficult for us when we cannot express our true feelings or when it may not be appropriate to do so. There is a great deal of emotional labor for people in the helping and service professions especially when they are expected to always smile or seem cheerful.

There are two ways that we handle emotional labor:

Surface acting- We change our outward expression but our feelings stay the same. This happens when we smile on the outside but still feel angry or hurt on the inside.

Deep acting- We making a deliberate effort to change our real feelings and try to understand what the other person is feeling. This happens often in nursing and helping professions. When someone is grumpy or unkind you may understand that they are coping with illness or pain.

There are consistent findings that while surface acting contributes to emotional exhaustion, this is not the case for deep acting. Deep acting has positively affected workers by increasing their sense of personal accomplishment. Trying to understand how the other person feels seems to be good for us.

Even in churches, there are people who have different views or opinions and there may be emotional labor involved with getting along well with others.



Martin Luther's explanation of the 8th Commandment gives us Christian guidance. **The Eighth Commandment: You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.** What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

I learned the last part as "put the best construction on everything." It is not enough simply not to lie to our neighbors. We must also defend them and speak well of them. Christians are encouraged to view everything in the kindest possible way. One thing I have found in my career as a nurse is that we often don't know everyone's story or everyone's struggles. To look at things in the kindest possible way or "put the best construction on everything" may have benefits for ourselves as well as others. It may increase our sense of personal accomplishment and decrease emotional exhaustion. Perhaps a good New Year's resolution for us is to view our interactions with others in the kindest way possible.


