



#### Pastor Paul writes...

"Giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!" Ephesians 5:20

Is it too soon to be talking about thanksgiving? After all, Thanksgiving Day is more than three months away. Not at all. St. Paul reminds us that the present time is always the right time for giving thanks. And Paul reminds that the circumstances in which we find ourselves, whatever they may be, are always an opportunity for giving thanks to God.

Consider the historical setting of these words. When Paul wrote these words to the Christians in Ephesus, he himself was sitting in a prison cell in Rome, awaiting trial before Caesar for preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Paul's freedom of movement was severely restricted. His independence was compromised. His choices were limited. His options were few. It would have been both natural and understandable for Paul to complain about his circumstances. To gripe about his loss of independence. To fume and to lash out over the unfairness of his situation. But what did Paul do?

He gave thanks to God for all His blessings. Paul's response to affliction and loss, to temptations and trials, was simple. Give thanks to God. Paul's ongoing attitude was one of "giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!"

This kind of attitude can only be achieved by the grace of God through the power of God's Spirit. God, in His mercy, gives us the strength of His Holy Spirit to help us to see the many blessings of God for us in the midst of life's trials and to give thanks to God for all His blessings. For Paul also wrote to the Romans: *"If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things?"* 

In whatever situation you find yourself, pray for the strength and wisdom of the Holy Spirit, so that your attitude may be one of "giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!"

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## STUDYING GOD'S WORD

### SUNDAY BIBLE CLASS I

In August we continue our study of the Book of Isaiah. Isaiah has often been called "the prince of prophets" because of the majestic sweep of his book and the powerful way in which he depicts the themes of justice and redemption, culminating in the great prophecies of the Messiah. Isaiah is like a miniature Bible. The first 39 chapters are filled with judgment upon immoral and idolatrous people – both Judah and the surrounding nations. But the final 27 chapters declare a message of hope and consolation. The name *Isaiah*, from the Hebrew *yeshaiah*, means "Yahweh is Salvation" which aptly sums up the book.

## Parish Nursing Newsletter August 2024

Here is some recent research that you may find interesting. Perhaps you can make some changes that will improve your health.

**Turn off the lights at night** – A study in *The Lancet* found that people who were exposed to the most light between 12:30 AM and 6 AM were more likely to develop diabetes than those who remained in darkness during that timeframe. It looks like it is healthier to keep the room dark at night.

**Eating more fruits and vegetables may help you sleep better** – Researchers from Finland looked at the relationship between how long people slept and fruit and vegetable consumption. People who ate fewer fruits and vegetables either slept less or slept too much. (*Medical News Today, June 6, 2024*) This gives us another reason to eat our fruits and vegetables. It is especially something to consider if you are having trouble sleeping.

**Drinking coffee may lower health risks from being sedentary** – Researchers in China found that people who drink coffee live longer than people who do not drink coffee. For people who were inactive and sat more than 8 hours a day, those who drank coffee lived longer. (A note on coffee – it has an antioxidant effect which can boost health. However for some people it can have some downsides like jitteriness and gut issues. You should work with your health care provider to find out if it may or may not be beneficial for your health). (*Medical News Today, June 25,2024*)

**Having gratitude is healthy** – A study of 49,000 older people in the nursing profession found that grateful people had lower rates of early death. Grateful people have also been found to have better cholesterol, better immune system function, less inflammation, less cardiovascular disease risk and less depression. This is something we can all do to improve our health. Think of three things for which you are grateful each day and write them in a journal or offer a prayer of thanksgiving.

## Living for Christ on this earthly home

Ephesians 2:9-10: "For we are all His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them."

Before any world would be known - before any thought: God is and was. God has a plan that includes you! His plan began with His wondrous creation (Jeremiah 32:17). The very stones cry out and declare His glory. His crowning achievement: man created in His image - to worship and honor him. But man sinned. He wanted to be like (or better than) God. That sin caused a huge rift between this world and God's habitation. God used many prophets,

kings and queens, and ordinary men and women to interact with His people. God made promises (I will never leave you or forsake you, I will provide a way for you, I will be your refuge) and He kept His word.

God, the Father, sent His only Son, Jesus, to be our Savior - to take our place on the cross. The huge cleft between God and man, caused by sin, was now bridged. It costs us nothing: a free gift of grace. It cost God everything: His only Son. As Christians we hold firmly to this truth: we have a savior - Jesus Christ. He is also our Lord. And His Holy Spirit guides and directs us.

We are all on this earthly journey together. What we do with the gifts God gives us does matter. We do not "earn" our way to heaven by works but by grasping hold of that gift. We live lives that glorify God.

Philippians 2:12 states: "So then my beloved, just as you have always obeyed, not in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who is at work in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure!"

Our conversion to faith in Christ; our ability to obey God's commandment; all of our abilities are from God. We live out our faith in our life in Christ.

Your life's actions do have a witness to others. Your trust in Him and willingness to pray for others reflects Jesus' life and ministry of <u>prayer</u>, <u>worship</u> and <u>service</u>.

In our earthly life, prayer is one of the most important parts of our ministry. Do we begin the day with prayer? Do we end the day with prayer? We have this tremendous opportunity to speak to the God of the universe, all powerful and almighty. We are urged to pray fervently (James 5). Our prayers for each other are to build up and encourage. Sharing answers to prayer can be wonderfully encouraging.

"Whatever you do for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it for Me." (Matthew 25:40). When we live for Jesus, everything we do is

> to honor Him. It might be as small as helping to pick apples or preparing a meal for a friend. Or doing yard work for a recent widow. Fixing a shower for a post- stroke victim and completing bird surveys for creation care are all acts of service.

> Jesus is the ultimate servant. Jesus is all-powerful God. He could have shown us how to be a dictator. But instead, He gave us the perfect example of a servant. The night of His trial, He washed His disciples' feet. The lowest job. Jesus tells us to

do the same. He instructs us to serve one another (1 Peter 4:9-10).

All of those activities that you do - those lives you touch - they are all leaving a witness of earthly events.

We spend our earthly days in worship, whether it is attending a magnificent worship service on a Sunday, or walking in God's creation and listening to His birds sing songs of praise. You can worship God as your

hands help another. I am reminded of the students of our Parish nurse who wash the feet of the homeless what an incredible act of worship! Our worship includes our thankfulness for all of His gifts, too many to list.

How can we serve God? How do we worship and honor Jesus? By being the "little Christs" - Christians

that He has called us to be. When you hear of a need - you respond. It might be in a practical way as well as prayerful. Zion's Christian Concerns committee is a place in which you can learn of many needs, and how you can respond. In service we continue to show the perfect love Jesus has for us. wait with someone and weep with them. Jesus wept with His friends (John 11:35).
