



Heading Toward Jerusalem

“From that time Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things from the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, ‘Far be it from you, Lord! This shall never happen to you.’ But he turned and said to Peter, ‘Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me. For you are not setting your mind on the things of God, but on the things of man.’” (*Matthew 16:21–23*)

Jesus’ disciples had been traveling with him for years. They had listened to his teaching, witnessed his miracles, and even gone out in his name to preach and heal. But now Jesus turns toward Jerusalem and tells them plainly why he came—to suffer and die. It was not what they wanted to hear. They preferred the glory, not the cross. They wanted the mountaintop moments, not the path of servanthood and sacrifice.

We know that feeling. In the church year, we’ve just come through Epiphany, a season filled with Jesus’ majesty—his miracles, his authority, his transfiguration on the mountain. But now, as Lent begins, we walk with him toward the cross.

Like the disciples, we are drawn to the glory. The servanthood part is harder. Why can’t we have one without the other?

This Lent, our Wednesday evenings will focus on how Jesus came “**For Us.**” He entered fully into our humanity—our struggles, our limitations, our pain. And because he has been present with us, we are called to be present with one another.

When Jesus washed the disciples’ feet, he told them, “If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another’s feet.” (*John 13:14*)

May this Lenten season renew in us a commitment to love one another as we have been loved by God. This is our calling, and this is the path Jesus walks before us.

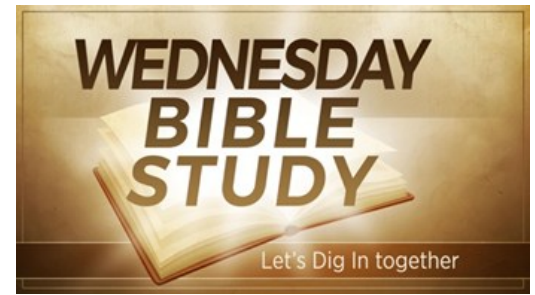
Sunday Bible Class I

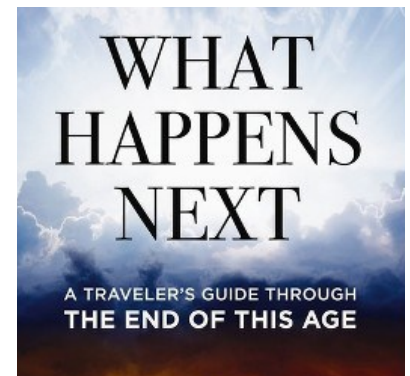

“I am the good shepherd; I know My sheep and My sheep know Me. Just as the Father knows Me and I know the Father, and I lay down My life for the sheep. (John 10:14, 15)

One of our favorite mental pictures is of Jesus, standing in a lush field, holding a precious lamb in His arms. We are those precious lambs. He gave His life for us: no greater gift.

We are often referred to as sheep and lambs. Sheep can do very little on their own. They have no sense of direction – once one takes off, the others follow. Hence my harrowing experience once on a hike. I was very thankful for that barbed wire boundary surrounding the sheep. Once they saw me with my hiking pole (staff?) they all came running towards me, in spite of my calling “I’m not your mama!” Sheep can’t find food on their own. If they fall down, they can’t get back up again. They have no way of protecting themselves. Thus the need of a shepherd. A good shepherd stays with his sheep. He gets down with them to guide and comfort. A good teacher gets down with her students to teach. God “got down with us” by sending His only Son, Jesus, to teach us and to give us

an example. The shepherd makes sure his sheep can rest. It must feel safe and have a full belly to rest. Sheep get stressed – just like us! The shepherd comes and makes sure the sheep are comfortable, well fed and safe so that they can rest.

Many animals are led in groups from the back. Ancient shepherds walked ahead of their sheep – leading them – with a familiar voice that the sheep recognized. If a sheep was somehow absent from the flock - the shepherd would go and search for it until it was found (Ancient Hebrew Research Center: “Shepherd Life”, Fred Wright). The people of the Holy Land were dependent upon sheep – for food, clothing and for their worship sacrifices. The shepherds of ancient times used a staff, a sling and a rod. They protected the flock from predators or from becoming lost. The shepherd often also had a flute which he played to soothe the flock and relieve their stress.



The shepherd would seek pasture on which to feed his flocks (1 Chronicles 4:39). Psalm 79:13 – the Lord gave His flocks pasture. If there were no pastures available the shepherd would lead his flock up to the hill country where there was grass. Water also needed to be provided. Psalm 23:2 – He leads his flock to still waters. Sheep cannot drink from swift moving waters.

When we think about how Jesus is our good shepherd – think on these many things He provides for us. Shelter, safety, food, peace. Jesus is indeed our Good Shepherd.

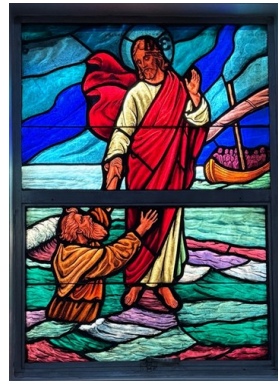
Jesus is the ultimate sacrifice for us. The children of God worshiped and performed sacrifices often to show thanks and for forgiveness for their wrongdoings. Jesus is the unblemished lamb – the Perfect Sacrifice. All our sins, our wrongdoings were laid on Him. And with His death on the cross, He took the punishment for those sins upon Himself. Only God’s Son could do this.

Board of Directors Notes Summary from Board Meeting February 8th

The Board met this month to review progress across several key areas including the pastoral transition, finances, outreach, and property planning.

The Transition Team has been working to prepare for a new pastor. Our congregational self-study has been completed, with 51 members participating — a strong and representative response. The next step will be small group gatherings where findings will be shared and discussed with the congregation.

The Outreach Committee is developing several initiatives to increase our visibility and engagement in the community. Both committees play an important role in the future growth of our congregation and will continue to provide regular updates.

The Board reviewed current finances and budget. To-date, actual expenditures align with what was budgeted. However, expenses may exceed the original budget due to needed capital improvements, including exterior painting and anticipated property upgrades. We also anticipate upcoming costs related to the hillside property and required engineering assessments. To continue to steward church gifts and investments well, the Board recently met with our investment advisors (1919) to review our financial strategy and determine appropriate cash flow needs.

The budget for the 2026–2027 fiscal year is being prepared, keeping in mind that we must align our committee activities and ministry vision with our financial planning. Property repairs and updates are needed. The church exterior face will be painted and will coordinate with the Alpha School. The congregation is voting on the final paint color. Kitchen appliances are aging and upgrades will be needed in the near future, including a freezer, refrigerator, and electrical panel improvements.

Finally, discussions with consultants and legal counsel continue regarding repair of the neighboring hillside. As we prepare for a new pastor and continued ministry growth, the congregation is encouraged to

PARISH NURSING

All God's People Sing

There has been some interesting research about the benefits of singing in groups (like we do in church).



One study found that community singing enhances health related quality of life in older adults. Benefits included improved morale, decreased loneliness, and reduced levels of anxiety and depression. Participants expressed high levels of enjoyment and satisfaction with the singing experience. The findings suggest that singing, particularly in group settings, may be associated with cognitive engagement and social connection.

Singing in groups has even been found to boost our immune function in ways that simply listening to the same music cannot.

Singing as part of a group or a choir has been found to promote a greater level of psychological well-being than solo singing.

Psychologists have long marveled at how people who sing together can develop a powerful sense of social cohesion, with even the "most reluctant of vocalists" becoming united in song.

Singing in church provides these benefits to all of us, even those of us who may not be able to participate in a choir. This is another way that being in church provides health benefits.

LINENS FOR LADIES
